BACKGROUND

Section 124(e) of Assembly Bill 130 requires LEAs to present an update on the annual update to the **2021–22 LCAP** and **budget overview for parents** on or before **February 28, 2022**, at a regularly scheduled meeting of the governing board.

EDUCATIONAL PARTNER ENGAGEMENT

- LBUSD was allocated a total of **\$11.2M** through the Budget Act of 2021 that was identified by the state after the LCAP was approved.
- Utilizing the ongoing **Budget Engagement Process**
- In October 2021, LBUSD deployed a new **ThoughtExchange**[©] seeking responses about how to best support current and future student needs.
 - How to spend LCFF, Title I, state and federal relief funds, including the recent ESSER III funds
 - Participation included 453 participants, 576 discrete thoughts and 11,549 ratings.
- Consistent themes emerged in the **Academic Support** strand and reinforced the belief that more interventions are needed for high-needs schools:
 - Academic Interventions
 - Literacy Interventions

USE OF ADDITIONAL CONCENTRATION FUNDING

With the concentration grant add-on funds, and using the responses from community engagement, LBUSD **augmented teaching staff** at schools with at least 55% unduplicated student enrollment.

LBUSD has hired 91 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) positions

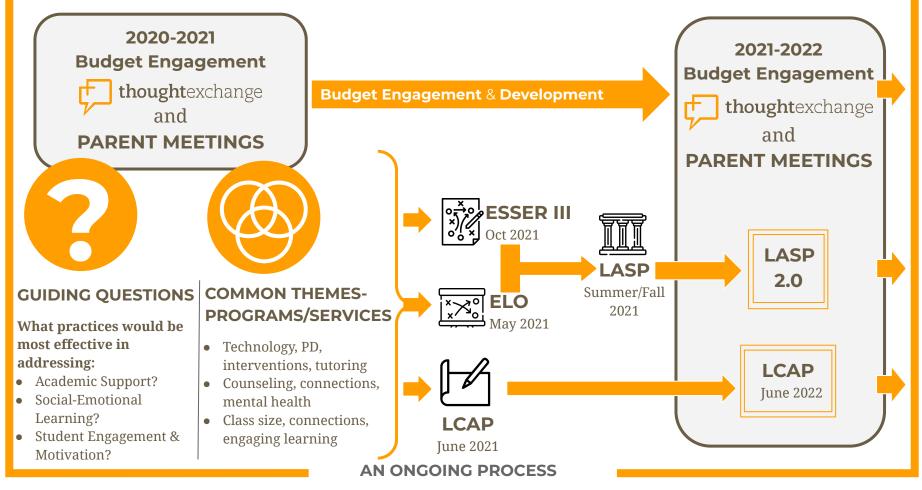

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ESSER III EXPENDITURE PLAN

ESSER III plan calls for expenses to begin in the **2022-23** fiscal year.

Budget

- Implementation of strategies for continuous & safe in-person learning: **\$85,368,965**
- Addressing the academic impact of lost instructional time: \$82,810,000
- Implementation of additional actions: **\$43,870,000**

USING FISCAL RESOURCES CONSISTENT WITH LCAP

LCAP

- Culmination of LBUSD's budget engagement process
- Foundation of funding of the district's base program.
- Concentration and supplemental grants provide for programs and services that are intended to meet the needs of the unduplicated pupils (Low SES, EL, Foster)

Coordination of multiple resources through the budget engagement process prevents stand alone/one-time services that are not sustainable.

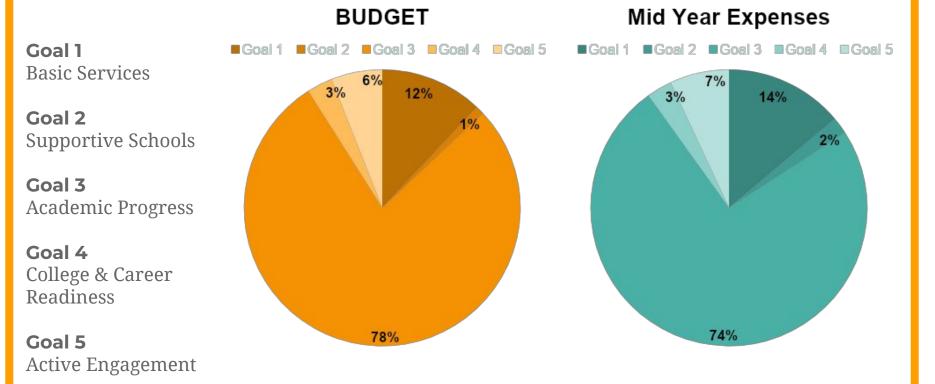

IMPACT TO THE BUDGET OVERVIEW FOR PARENTS

When LBUSD adopted our LCAP and Budget in June 2021, the state budget act was not complete. The adopted state budget included additional funds that were not anticipated by our district. The impact to our adopted Budget Overview for Parents (BOP) is as follows:

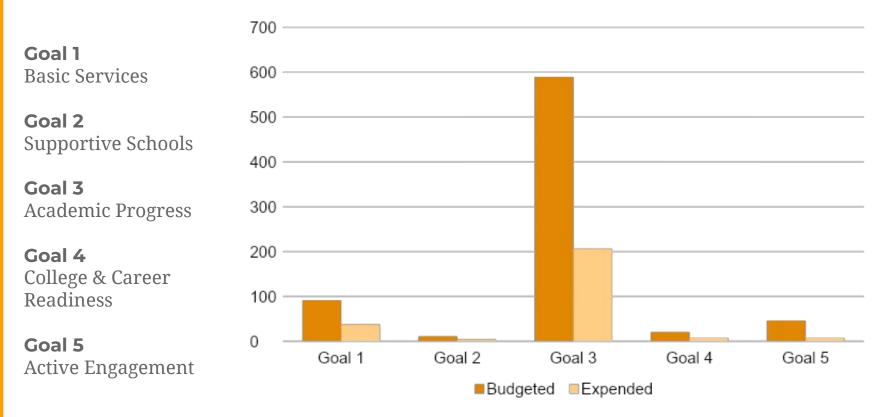
